



CONFERENCE DETAILS



The conference will be held in the mid-13th-century chapter house of Chester cathedral, an Anglo-Saxon church which was rebuilt as a great Norman monastery from 1092 and established as a cathedral in 1541. Since the 10th century it has housed the relics of the Anglo-Saxon royal saint Werburgh (*d*. 699), daughter of the first Christian king of Mercia and a princess of the royal Kentish line. Her milieu was the conversion of the Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, the authority they drew from the ancient places of Roman occupation, and their often warlike interactions with the existing Christian kingdoms of the British west. These foundations of Christianity in the North-West, and their powerful resonance through the succeeding centuries, provide the theme for this year's conference.

This will be followed a guided tour around the cathedral and a visit to the church of St John the Baptist, reputedly founded by King Aethelred in 689, and Chester's first cathedral, and the city's Roman amphitheatre, which remained a focal point of Roman authority in the early medieval city.

We will then meet that evening for the annual SCA conference dinner in a converted church on Chester's Newgate Street.



CONFERENCE DETAILS



On the Friday before the conference proper, delegates will have the opportunity to join a tour of Chester's famous city walls and castle, with the expert guidance of Simon Ward (Grosvenor Museum), meeting at Queen Victoria's statue outside the castle. We will then gather for an informal dinner at the King's Head, a cosy Jacobean inn on Lower Bridge Street.

On the Sunday, we will be visiting a number of important sites relating to early Christian archaeology in the Chester area. We are delighted to be able to join with Professor Howard Williams of Project Eliseg, a research project into a great stone cross raised on an earlier Bronze Age burial mound by King Concenn of Powys (d. 854) to honour his great-grandfather Elisedd. The monument was of enduring importance to the local ritual landscape, giving its name to Valle Crucis Abbey, a Cistercian monastery founded adjacent in 1201 whose substantial ruins we will also visit.

We will then travel east to the site of one of the more famous interactions between early British and Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, at the monastery of Bangor-is-y-Coed on the banks of the River Dee. Established c. 560 by St Dunawd, Bede records that this was an enormous British monastery of several thousand monks, 1200 of whom were massacred by King Aethelfrith of Northumbria after the Battle of Chester in 616.

We will continue on to Farndon – the death place of King Edward the Elder in 924 – whose 14th-century church of St Chad lies within a circular churchyard indicative of much earlier Christian practice on the site. The opportunity will then be given to walk cross the medieval bridge to Holt, whose medieval church and castle saw intense fighting during the English Civil War, before returning to Chester in good time for onward travel home.
