### CONFERENCE DETAILS ~

The 2015 conference will be held in Leicester, a city with a variety of religious sites and houses, including the Cathedral, which began as the Saxon Church of St Martin, and St Nicholas' parish church, traditionally the oldest church fabric itself in Leicester which possibly dates to the 9<sup>th</sup> century. However, despite the splendid array of urban places of worship, it is the surrounding rural landscape which provides the theme for this year's conference: the early rural church foundations and their connections with their respective settlements, two categories which are too often kept separated, rather than integrated, in medieval studies. From the earthworks and possible priory remains at Kirby Bellars to the ruined hilltop church at Colston Bassett, the nearby ecclesiastical scene is diverse in its church types, settlement forms and relationships within the landscape. Through an assorted range of talks and in-depth site tour of the nearby rural landscape, this theme of 'church and settlement', whether intimate relationship or nodding acquaintance, can be explored through different cases, allowing our definitions to be questioned and according it the special value it deserves.

This will be preceded by a special guided tour on the Friday evening around the Cathedral and new Grey Friars King Richard III Visitor Centre, site of the Franciscan friary made famous recently as the burial place of Richard III, followed by an informal meal at Le Pierre Bistrot on Millstone Lane.

Sunday will be devoted to a full-day excursion to local churches and settlements around southern Nottinghamshire and northern Leicestershire, including Little Dalby, Kirby Bellars, Car Colston and Colston Bassett, where we will lunch at the Neville Arms in Kinoulton.

# CONFERENCE DETAILS C



Leicester Cathedral

On the Friday before the conference proper, delegates will have the opportunity to join a tour which will start at Leicester's cathedral, originally St Martin's church which received its first bishop in 680, though from the 11<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup> century it was under neighbouring dioceses. Largely rebuilt in the 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> centuries, its latest addition is of course the ambulatory tomb for Richard III, with the newly-built Grey Friars Visitor Centre adjacent. This unique opportunity to receive a guided tour of the centre after hours will be followed by an informal dinner at Le Pierre Bistrot, one of Leicester's finest restaurants situated in the heart of the city.



On the Sunday, we will be visiting a range of captivating sites relating to the diverse church and settlement themes of the conference, centred in the southern Nottinghamshire/northern Leicestershire region. This will begin with Little Dalby, a classic church south-east of Melton Mowbray isolated amongst the earthworks of a deserted medieval village, now within the park of a stately home, where we will tour its fascinating structures. This will be followed by visiting Kirby Bellars, just to its west, an interesting earthwork site with a fine church that is reputed to be the remains of the priory church.

We will then travel north to Colston Bassett, one of the Vale of Belvoir's more picturesque villages, where we will lunch on the way at the well-reputed Neville Arms pub and restaurant in Kinoulton. Afterwards, we will be guided around the ruined church and its surrounding landscape by Andrew Marriott.

Finally, we will continue on to Car Colston, where Paul Everson will provide a detailed tour on the village and church, before returning back to Leicester for the homeward journey.


#### By Taxi


• Taxis are available from a taxi rank within Leicester train Station, or if you prefer to book in advance the below numbers might be helpful:
